LEQTF / 8(G) / BORSF

 The fund was established in 1986 to improve the quality of education in the state. Since its inception the LEQTF has provided over \$1.907 Billion for educational enhancements and opportunities at every level of education in Louisiana. Within Treasury, the fund is known as LEQTF; within BESE, this fund is known as the 8(g) fund; and within Regents it is called the Board of Regents Support Fund (BORSF).

TIMELINE

1984 Settlement of litigation

1986 Voters pass constitutional amendment

1987 \$540 Million deposited into the trust fund

2004 Trust fund passes \$1 Billion in market value

2005 Allocation to BESE & Regents passes \$1 Billion 2023 Market Value reaches \$1.569 Billion



LEQTF: THE MATH

 The Permanent Fund, the corpus of the investment portfolio, receives and holds 25 percent of the earnings from investment income and royalty income, and 75 percent of the earnings from net capital gains and losses. The Support Fund, which is split between BESE & Regents, receives 75 percent of the earnings from investment income and royalty income and 25 percent of the earnings from net capital gains and losses.










Annual Allocations to BESE and Regents



CUMULATIVE ALLOCATIONS TO FUND









College and Career Readiness Definition

College and career ready means that individuals graduate from high school prepared for university, community college, or technical college programming without need for remediation or corequisite support and/or graduate prepared for employment with the foundational skills required for entry into career pathways, possessing both rigorous content knowledge and the ability to apply that knowledge.

Graduates possess a baseline of the core competencies tied to life and career success in the 21st century—effective communication and collaboration, critical and creative problem solving, adaptable resilience, cultural competence, and self-reflective awareness—and are poised for further development based on individual plans and goals through higher education or career training.

This definition is aspirational. It is incumbent upon the components of Louisiana's education enterprise in policy and practice to meet students where they are and facilitate the development of individuals to their fullest potential.


2023 TOPS Annual Report

Act 1202 of the 2001 Regular Legislative Session requires the Louisiana Board of Regents to provide a report analyzing various aspects of the TOPS Program. Act 587 (2014), Act 227 (2015), Act 407 (2021), and Act 665 (2022) modified prior law to clarify and specify data points to be addressed in the report.



TOPS students continue to have higher graduation rates





Governor's Military and Veteran Friendly Campus Annual Report

- R.S. 17:3138.5 and R.S. 17:3165.2 addressed the need for comprehensive statewide support for military veterans, their spouses and dependents transitioning from military service to public and non-public postsecondary education. (Act 232 of the 2017 Session and Act 429 of the 2021 Session)
- R.S. 17:3138.5 amended Act 429 of 2021 to authorize the Board of Regents to establish additional tiers of recognition for institutions. (Act 53 of the 2023 Session)



Governor's Military and Veteran Friendly Campus Annual Report

- All 28 public postsecondary undergraduate degree-granting institutions have earned the <u>Governor's Military and Veteran</u> <u>Friendly Campus</u> designation.
- This year also marks the first time a private university, Dillard University, has attained the designation.



Postsecondary Inclusive Education Advisory Council Annual Report

- Act 682 of the 2022 Regular Legislative Session created the Louisiana Postsecondary Inclusive Education Advisory Council.
- Under the jurisdiction of the Board of Regents, the Council is charged with identifying opportunities to expand existing or establish new inclusive education programs that provide pathways to postsecondary degree, certificate, and apprenticeship programs designed to increase independent living and employment opportunities for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.
- Annually, Act 682 charges the Advisory Council to produce a report addressing the key issues and research topics listed in the legislation.

Postsecondary Inclusive Education Advisory Council Annual Report

- A current RFA is open. Applications are due by January 19, 2024.
- Institutions may apply for a \$20,000 planning grant, and up to \$60,000 (with a 1-1 match) to begin a new program.

Act 959 Project: DCC Deckhand Training Facility

- The Louisiana Community and Technical College System submitted a project under the provisions of Act 959 for consideration on behalf of Delgado Community College (DCC) to construct a new deckhand training facility on DCC's existing Maritime and Industrial campus.
- The project scope involves construction of a new facility with 3,000 square feet (SF) of teaching space and 2,000 SF of concrete staging area. The first floor will contain a teaching kitchen and dining area where students will learn to plan and prepare meals onboard vessels.
 The second floor will contain classroom space and a mock ship bridge, which will look out over a mock barge vessel.
- This project will complement the maritime and industrial fire fighting, radar, safety, and U.S.
 Coast Guard-approved training already underway on the DCC campus.
- Total project cost is approximately \$1.3M and will be funded with a grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration (\$800,000) and self-generated revenues derived from DCC's building use fees (\$500,000).



STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Senior Staff recommends approval of the Act 959 project submitted by the Louisiana Community and Technical College System, on behalf of Delgado Community College, for the purpose of expanding the existing Maritime and Industrial Training facility on the New Orleans East campus.

Universal Transfer Pathways

Seamless Transfer of General Education

- BOR staff has worked in concert with the Statewide Articulation Transfer Council to implement the requirements of Act 308 (2022), building on earlier work beginning in 2003. That work has created an updated **Master Course Articulation Matrix**. That matrix **guarantees** that every general education course transfers between all Louisiana public colleges and universities. If a receiving institution teaches the transfer course, then the matrix provides the one-to-one match. If the receiving institution does not teach a one-to-one equivalent course, the receiving institution provides the appropriate number of hours' credit in that area of the general education requirements.
- Regents AA Policy 2.23 also guarantees that if a student receives credit for a general education course through credit for prior learning at any Louisiana public college or university, that credit will also transfer seamlessly to any other public institution.



Universal Transfer Pathways

Act 308 of the 2022 Legislative Session

 A new universal transfer requirement will be implemented through faculty-driven establishment of statewide transfer pathways for the top 20 programs in the state.



Universal Transfer Pathways

AA Policy 2.25

- Universal transfer pathways are subject or discipline-specific associate's degrees (AALT or ASLT) that include the full Regents-required 39 units of general education courses plus 21 units of major requirements.
- The full 60 hours of the programs will transfer into any of the corresponding bachelor's degree programs at Louisiana public four-year institutions.
- Students will transfer with junior status and will be able to complete the bachelor's degree on time.

CONSTITUTIONAL REQUIREMENT

ARTICLE VII, SECTION 10.1.(C)

The State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and the Board of Regents shall annually submit to the legislature and the governor not less than 60 days prior to the beginning of the regular session of the legislature a proposed program and budget for the expenditure of the monies in the Support Fund.






BORSF REVENUES & EXPENDITURES 2002-03 THROUGH 2022-23

BORSF BUDGET CONSIDERATIONS FY 2024-2025

- Official State Estimate (REC): \$17.85M (May 2023)
- Treasury Estimate: \$16.31M (October 2023)
- Mid-Point: \$17.08M
- Actual Revenues Received FY 2022-23: \$16.11M
- Fiscal Challenges (market instability, interest rates, inflation control measures, royalty declines)
- Some remaining buffer from FY 2020-21 capital gains

FY 2024-25 Recommended Base Budget: \$17.85M, with contingencies

CONTINGENCIES FOR CHANGES IN REVENUE

HIGHER THAN BUDGETED

- Additional revenues allocated as approved by the Board
- No increase in spending authority

LOWER THAN BUDGETED:

- Spring/Summer 2023 consideration of latest REC projections to determine what budget adjustments to new monies, if any, are needed prior to the start of the competitive cycle (federal matching, BOR/SREB, and Endowed Professorships will be maintained)
- If partial reductions are needed, proportionate cuts taken in first-year amounts allocated for proposals across all competitive programs and subprograms
- If additional cuts are needed after all competitive programs eliminated, reductions taken to the non-competitive Endowed Professorships subprogram once funding guarantees are met
- If additional cuts needed after all first-year funds are eliminated, reductions made to federal matching commitments and/or prior contractual obligations

- No increase in spending authority

Lower than Budgeted

- If partial reductions are needed, proportionate cuts taken in first-year amounts allocated for proposals across all competitive programs and subprograms
- If additional cuts are needed after all competitive programs eliminated, reductions taken to the non-competitive Endowed Professorships subprogram once funding guarantees are met
- If additional cuts needed after all first-year funds are eliminated, reductions made to federal matching commitments and/or prior contractual obligations

REVISE CURRICULAR PATHWAYS

- Utilized Curricular Analytics to quantify curriculum complexity for each of our degree programs
- Focused on high-complexity scores indicating potential obstacles for students
- By May, 21 degree programs initiated or completed proposals to lower complexity scores
- Notably, 13 of these programs were originally flagged for high curricular complexity
- 9 programs approved by C&C and OAA, implemented in Fall 2023
- 2 programs under current review by C&C
- 10 programs under review within their respective departments
